

Troop 505 Scout Camping Checklist Weekend Front Country Camping

- Edit this list to create your own personal checklist to avoid packing errors.
- Try to pack light, but bring enough equipment to be comfortable, dry, and safe.
- To select each item, use BSA recommendations, other scouters, magazines, web sites and personal preference.
- No electronic devices, no matches, no lighters. Personal tents must be preapproved by a Scoutmaster.

Cap, official troop or BSA		Duffle bag or Pack (required if hiking in)
BSA shirt, short or long sleeve		Waterproof pack cover, if using a pack
BSA long pants or equal		Ground cloth for under or over tent floor
BSA shorts or equal (warm weather)		Bowl (plastic or SS) and metal camping cup
BSA belt and buckle		Knife, fork and spoon
Troop neckerchief and slide		Water bottle(s) or canteen
Troop t-shirt		Sleeping bag suitable for expected weather
Waterproof boots (no sneakers)		Sleeping pad(s) (required for cold weather)
Change of shoes (optional)		Extra blanket for cold weather
Poncho (required)		Flashlight(s) with spare batteries, spare bulb
Waterproof jacket, as desired		Personal first aid kit
Waterproof pants, as desired		Small bound pad of paper and pen
Sweatshirt or jacket		Approved pocketknife (requires tot'en chip)
Extra layers for cold weather		Watch, water resistant
Parka, gloves, hat for cold weather		Glasses and hard case, if required
Socks, wool or synthetic, (4) pair		Sunglasses
Underclothing (synthetic preferred)		Scouting handbook in waterproof bag
Change(s) of clothing, as desired		Religious book(s), if desired
Work gloves		Sunblock
Towel, small or bandana		Lip salve with sunblock
Toothbrush and paste		Reusable camera, if desired
Liquid soap (camp suds)		Insect repellent (warm weather)
Comb		Folding chair, if desired
Toilet paper, half roll in zip lock bag		Day pack or waist pack, if desired
Compass		Musical instrument, if desired
Whistle		Duct tape, 3 ft wrapped around pencil or water bottle
Plastic bags, large, (4)		Spare boot laces
Mesh dunk bag
